The day turned out to be one of the rare fine Spring days, and put every one in good humor. There are two deeds, one for the church edifice, and the other for the lot occupied by Chapel and Manse.

The Church lot was deeded to the congregation by Selden T. Scranton and wife, with a reversion clause. The date of the deed is

April 12th, 1871.

The ground for the Chapel and Manse was donated to the Oxford First Church for the little flock of Presbyterians living here near the Furnace, but holding their membership at Oxford First, and served by the pastor of that church.

The date of this deed was December 30th,1848. On this plot the old Stone Chapel was erected on or

before 1848.

Now the interesting fact about this deed is that it was made by Wm.P.Robeson and wife. We should have thought it would have been by G.W.& S.T.Scranton, who bought the Furnace in 1839.

The fact is that when the Scranton brothers bought the Furnace they got but very little land, merely enough to operate the Furnace.

That is evident by the fact of the deed for Old Chapel by Wm.P. Robeson and wife, showing that the Scrantons did not own this lot ly-

ing so near the Furnace.

Also the deed for the Furnace bought in 1839 was not recorded until April 1st,1846, and the value was \$4,317.49; whereas the whole estate was sold in 1834 to Wm.P. Robeson and his brother-in-law. John F. Maxwell for \$46,000.

In 1847 a new company was formed with Charles Scranton at the head, and including his brothers, G.W.&S.T.W.E.Dodge and others. This made possible the purchase of all the old Furnace estate of about 4,000acres, including mines buildings etc.

The Scranton brothers, .W.& S.T. were at that time in Scranton, Pa. but held their original interests in the Furnace, and in fact never parted with them during their life

time.
