Old Mine Heads (continued) The Quinn Slope By Patrick Kempsey

As we have finished with the Baltas Millberger Group of mines we will move a few yards further south to the slope known as the Quinn Slope from Michael Quinn the Superintendent.

Well do I remember when I and three other men were down in this mine repairing a pump when there was a terrible crash a hundred feet above the pump house. In a twinkling down comes a great mass of rock of all sizes, and when they would strike high spots in their downward flight the fire would glow like from a great mass of lightning bugs. At first they went by on both sides of the pump house, but they changed their course and came right down on top of the large timbers which formed the roof of the pump house. Believe me at this part of the earth wake, we thought it was, we were a pretty scared bunch.

We asked the food Lord to spare us and I think it was through His goodness we came through it without receiving a scratch.

You will bear in mind all this time we were in darkness as the first crash put out our lights. We remained in the dark for ages, it seemed to us, but the crashing of rocks became gradually less and finally stopped, which was a great relief to us.

Then the pump tender, Michael Ott, got a light burning and with great courage started in the direction from where the knowledge of the history of the Shippen mass of rock came, and by close inspection saw there were no signs of any more to come He came back and said his belief that we would not be bothered again.

So we finished our job and got in the car and were hoisted to the surface. We Pelt grateful to be spared.

On an other occasion I and the same)ien were in the same pump house with a man who had never before been down in a mine, and a great electric storn occurred on the surface, and the lightning came down the pipe lines and bell wire, so that we were all shocked and in a stupor for some But like the other scare, when we got our work done we took the first car
