The meeting last Sabbath evening was led by Miss Elizabeth Zapp, who took the place of the appointed leader at the Plast moment, but conducted a very interesting service. The willingness of all to help is very encouraging.

The Ladies Aid Society will hold their monthly meeting at the Manse next Wednesday. As no meeting was held last a large attendance is requested by the President, Mrs Charles Renner.

The Sunday School attendance last Sunday was 115. The week before had 104. The hope for future growth is bright, as the interest grows with the faithfulness of the officers and teachers,-all of whom wore present last Sabbath.

SIXTY SIX YEARS ago to-day this Church edifice was dedicated to God. That was on January 31st, 1866. Dr.Frederick Knighton was the Moderator of the Session and presided at the services of the day. The first Pastor, Rev. J. Clark Cline was installed on the same day, who pronounced the dedicatory prayer. Rev. W.H. Kirk, the Pastor at Belvidere preached the sermon.

It was a great day Members of the Presbytery, and ministers of other churches were present. The devoted Presbyterians, less than a hundred in number, did not stint themselves in erecting this house of worship. They made it as large and substantial, and as fine as they possibly could do, thinking not only of themselves but of the generations to come.

The building is still as beautiful and solid as when first constructed, and barring accidents will stand for centuries to come. From the time of dedication to the present it has been in constant use for religious purposes. The mines have been idle much of the time, and all human enterprises of the community have come and gone in that period, but the Church has never closed nor slacked its labor for the Kingdom of Christ.

All the members of the Church 66 years ago have passed to their revard or have left the community and the Church. But new members have been added from year to year, and so the river of salvation flows on as at first. For it is the Church of Christ, and is built upon the Rock of Ages. The Bulletin has received a very interesting letter from Mrs John Vosseller now living with her daughter, Mrs Millie Hartman of Phillipsburg. She requests a copy of Bulletin #95, which will be sent her gladly. She writes: "I had the pleasure of reading over one of the Weekly Bulletins, and I was delighted to read one containing the names of the old Oxford Band. My husband being one,-Mr. John Vosseller. Also my daughter, Millie Vosseller, was always a little worker in tha church, and read it with pleasure. "She says that her sister Mrs.George Haycock sent her the copy she saw. Mrs Vosseller, we understand was not a mamber of our Church. but Millie her daughter was, until removal

to Phillipsburg.

The Paster had a pleasant call in to home of Mr. and Mrs. Elect Pittanger of Washington, on last Tuesday. Mrs.Pittenger showed us the finest picture we have yet seen of the old Oxford furnace. It must have been taken fifty years ago, as the building was entire with the smokestack and the cupala tower Mrs.Pittenger's brother was intact: Of even more interest to

at one time engineer there, and she recalls that as a little girl she took his dinner to him. us was a page from the Newark News of the date, August 27, 1898, which Mrs. Pittenger has treasured all these years. It is a write up of Oxford, with nine illustrations. covering nearly an entire page. It was during the hard times in the nineties, and especially hard in Oxford, because the mines and all the works were closed down from

May 1895 to 1900. A doleful picture is drawn of the poverty and desolation of the town, as seen by the reporter. The Article is headed," Decay and death of a Jersey Town." The head lines go on to state that "Only a few old men and women left to tell the story of its former greatness. Mills and residences without a sign of life, about them mute evidence of the fate that has over taken the beautiful and historic spot on the Blue mountains. Invention of wire nails given as the Chief cause of the annihilation of the industry that made the place. " Abundant details are given to support this sad picture, which we must psss over

at this time, but a pathetic story will possibly be recalled by some of our older readers. It runs thus: "Along the roadside are a number of deserted houses. One or two are inhabited by old crones, who mumble about the days gone by, when their 'Men' were alive and blithe and hearty. Old Mrs. Finnegan, the widow of an old-time miner prepares dinner for her 'good man' every day and takes it to the deserted shaft. But no 'good man' comes to the opening to claim his midday meal, and the poor old

soul carries the pail back and eats the mess herself." Doubtlessly the conditions then in Oxford were very bad, but the accoun hat is badly overdrawn, as our Church records clearly show. That very year there vere nearly 300 members, and 125 children in the Sunday School. Though without a pastor the Church kept up all the services ith preaching every Sabbath, and the finances amounted to \$1000. This is for

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only our own church.

The Young People are at work on a new play to be presented about the first of March. Oxford has always been successful in dramatic productions, and we may be sure of an interesting

performance when given by our young folks. In this connection it will be of interest to give the cast of a play given by our church in 1912. The program has

been kept by Mrs Wm. Hornbaker and placed in our hands for use in the Bulletin. The Title of the play was"The Country Minister!, and was advertised as "A splendid
