But I think that must have been when 'Class 10' raised so much money; as they painted the Church steeple etc., had new stained windows, painted the manse, furnished the Pastor's study, etc. etc. For they were always doing something, and as soon as one affair was over they were ready for another.

"They had Pink Teas: Rummage Sales. Pig Roasts; Supper etc., of all kinds, and such a crowd of faithful, helpful workers, it would be hard to find.... Some of them are gone. Some still there; but they will all always be fondly remembered by their 'Teacher of Class 10'."

## More about the Small Pox Plague

Dr.L.B. Hoagland's memory, stirred up by Mr. Weston's reference to the small pox epidemic, has given the Editor some very interesting details. He came to Oxford October 27th, 1881, and bought the practice of Dr. Hartpence, who moved immediately to Washington, N.J. Only a few months after he settled here the small pox broke out. This was in the early spring of 1882. Dr. Hoagland was called to attend the first case, a freshly arrived German

imbgrant by the name of Henry Stelter. On the first visit the young physcian was not sure it was small pox, but the next visit made it certain, and the proper measures were taken. The town was agog with excitement, the more so when new cases developed, and every body was ordered to be vaccinated. Dr. Powers was appointed town physcian by the Town Committee, but there was plenty of work to keep all of the doctors busy. For there were 47 cases of the dread disease in Oxford alone, and these all developed from the first case of Mr. Stelter. Fully one third of them proved fatal.

The Loctors carried the vaccine with them, and on the streets and everywhere people who thus sought preventive help were told to roll up their sleeves and be vaccinated. The fee was 25 cents.

Rev.E.C.Cline, pastor of our Church at that time was indefatigable in his pastoral attention to them, and called in all homes where there were cases, whether in Protestant, Catholic or whatnot." He was the only clergyman in the community to do so.

Mrs Willian Hornbaker is keeping a file of the Bulletins and cherishes them highly. From her we learn that her father, Henry Repp was an expert miner, and that he opened the first coal mine in Scranton, Pa. He returned to Oxford in the 1830's and reopend the old mine Hill shaft. Her brother Matt. Repp was engineer in the old furnace in the middle 1860's and she recalls that as a girl in early teens she took him dinner on Sunday evenings when he was on double shift. This would be at the period of the Civil War when the furnace was busy night and day in casting cannon balls car wheels etc.

# Another Topic Card (1888) for the young people.
