Oxford Hemories By George R. Searing

Bulletin # 142 in referring to Mr. W. A. Jones, recalls a conversation I had last summer at Silver Lake. The Mt. Hermon Sunday School had a picnic and Mrs. Bell stinson came with them. We had a pleasant time talking about the good times in Oxford and Jonestown. The first time she met Mr. L.Stinson came about in this way: Mr. A.H. Allen went to call on Mr. Jonesand his daughter accompanied him. This home was a social circle for people residing in that vicinity, and all were likely to drift around some time before twilight. On this night Mr. Stinson was visiting Mr. J. Bigelows and the conversation was about the contest of croquet. And as that was the most exciting out door game of that time, they decided to go down, and , on arriving were invited to join in the game.

But after meeting Miss Bell Allen he concluded he was outclassed in the game. So he withdrew and sought a seat for two among the roses to enjoy the company and the fragrance that filled the air. Under these pleasant conditions he was reluctant to leave. Besides it was only a mile and a quarter to Mr.Allen's store. the surrounding was different, but the attractions were greater.

It was not long before Mr.Stinson won Miss Bell's hand . Mr. Allen, after meditating some time thought that there must be something in this young man to be able to win his daughter and take her from hone, and rather than that he sold Mr. Stinson the business. Mr. and Mrs. Stinson greatly enjoyed their home. They had one son, -Frank. The latter joined the Junior Endeavor and Sunday School, and grew up in the wholesome influence of the church. He graduated from the Orford High School and completed his education in Newark Business College. He now holds a responsible position in the Lackawana R.L. office at Scranton.
