of the Citizens of Oxfora, M.J. to the State Commission on Historic Sites for the Old Oxford Blast Furnace.

To the State Commission on Historic Sites
The the citizens of Oxford, in a special
public meeting called for the purpose,
would solicit the attention of the Commission to the claims of the old blast
Furnace to be preserved as a State
institution; and,

Whereas: the furnace was erected in 1741and was in more or less continuous operation until 1884--over 140 years, and in part still stands and is the oldest and probably the only original stack of the colonial period standing in the State; and

Thereas: the furnace had an important place in the industrial development, and also in the military struggles, of the Country, supplying iron for all kinds of domestic purposes andmaking cannon balls and munitions of war in the French-Indian the Revolutionary and the Civil vars; and

Abereas: the furnace has, with one exception, the most complete historical records of any colonial blast furnace of the State; and

Whereas: the owners of the property (The Warren Foundry & Pipe Corp.) have officially decided to offer the furnace free of cost to any competent organization able to to preserve it as a public monument; and

Whereas: the furnace requires prompt attention as the original stack is distintegrating, and if it be preserved for the future, needs immediate restoration and repair; and

Thereas: now is an opportune time, as the Relief Administrators of the County have offered to employ their relief forces to do the large amount of work necessary to put it in proper condition to preserve it for the future; and

Therefore: be it resolved by the citizens of Oxford here assembled representing the 1700 citizens of the Town. that we do here with urgently request and petition the State Commission on Historic Sites to take over the furnace property for the State to plan for its restoration and preservation as a historic monument. and supervise all matters pertaining to the property.

To this end we do heartily pledge, according to our ability, full cooperation with the Commission, and do hereby authorize the Chairman and Secretary of this meeting to sign this overture as the act of this meeting.
