William Henry and Family By George 3. Humphrey

I have been greatly interested in the sketches of the lives of the two William Henry's in recent Bulletins. particularly in that of William Henry of Nazareth and Oxford, with whose family I was quite intimate.

With the possible exception of my old friend, Mrs.O.N. Perry, I presume that I am the only person now living having a distinct recollection of Mr. Henry. When I first came to Oxfor he made frequent visits there, usually staying at the home of his daughter Ellen Clarissa, Mrs. S. T. Scranton.

As I lived with the family for near ly a year, and after that spent many at "Chestnut Grove" I always met Mr. Henry during his stay there, and came to know him quite well. While there is now no "William Henry" in the family, it is interesting to know that the name is preserved in the person of William Henry Tegtmeir, son of Adolf and Georgine Henry Tegtmeir; the latter being the daughter of the last William Henry whom I have just mentioned. He is the great, great, grandson of the William, who rediscovered Oxford in the 1830s, as described in the Bulletins, and he bids fair to be a worthy representative of a distinguished ancestry.

Oxford has indeed during its long history been the residence of many persons of importance, who in their day had a great influence upon the affairs of the Country; may it continue to do so!
